URBAN FARMING PRACTICES IN EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

Our solution to the deepening food and climate crisis, and better health and well-being begins with little children. Our initiative of introducing urban agriculture practices in educational institutions across three states of India have made an impact at the policy level.

When trained student volunteers, teachers and urban local body members work together, the impact resonates beyond the boundaries of the school. Sustainable agriculture practices in schools support small and medium-sized farmers, improve the livelihood of the local community, reduce hunger and give access to safe and healthy food.

Objectives

- Include urban agriculture program in the school curriculum.
- Locally grown organic vegetables to be served in the school mid-day meal program.
- Improve the health and well-being of students and villagers.
- Reduce non-communicable diseases (NCDs) among school students by promoting physical activity through urban agriculture practices.
- Support small and medium-sized farmers
- Inculcate a sense of responsibility among students towards natural biodiversity and its conservation
- Achieve SDG targets linked to urban farming



The sustainable agriculture practice in schools can help achieve multiple SDGs. The project is linked to at least nine of the SDGs. Besides ending hunger and promoting health and well-being, it responds to climate action, ending poverty, making cities liveable, etc. Urban farming in schools supports the local food system by producing high-quality organic vegetables and linking it with the local markets.

How it works

We provide technical support to the Department of Education in implementing urban farming in schools. An 'Urban Farming Club' is constituted in the selected schools, consisting of teachers and volunteer students. The club monitors the farming activities. The schools are provided with vegetable seeds, manures, bio-fertilizers, and other equipment required for farming. Only local varieties of vegetables are used, also considering the nutritional requirement of children. Schools with space constraints have taken up terrace farming.







Stakeholders and Partners

To ensure the sustainability of the initiative, the project is implemented with the help of various government agencies and community groups. Local Self Government Department, Urban Local Bodies, Department of Education, and the selected schools in three states are the major stakeholders.

Kerala Forest Research Institute and Kerala Agriculture University are the technical partners.

Donors and other partners include HealthBridge, Canada, Biological Research Innovation Centre and Solutions, My Dream Garden, etc.

Impact

The initiative has resulted in changes at the policy level. It has resulted in allocating funds through the Local Development Fund of the Member of Legislative Assembly and Member of Parliament, Local Self Government Department, and Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan (Government of India), to replicate the organic farming practices in other schools in the respective states.

At the policy level, the project is now included in the General Education Protection Mission of Government of Kerala and is being implemented in 49 schools.

We have been approached by the Municipality of Malappuram, Kerala, to do an assessment of schools and kindergartens in the district to initiate urban agriculture programme. ESAF is empanelled as the implementation and monitoring agency and the budget will be allocated by the municipality to run the programme.

In Karnataka, the programme was piloted in two schools. The success of the programme prompted the Department of Education, Bangalore City, to sign an MoU with ESAF to identify potential schools in the city to scale up the programme.

In Assam, the local farmers gave 1.5 acres of land to school students in Majuli district to cultivate vegetables. Out of which, half an acre is cultivated by teachers and students, and the rest by their parents. The entire resources including seeds and fertilizers were mobilized within the community.









Recognitions

ESAF received the Smart Cities India Award, 2018, instituted by India Trade Promotion Organization (A Government of India Enterprise, Department of Commerce), Centre of Excellence - IoT (A joint initiative of MeitY, ERNET, NASSCOM supported by Government of Karnataka) and Exhibitions India Group. The award recognises pioneering projects that aim to make cities liveable, sustainable and economically friendly. ESAF bagged the award in the Academic Programme Award category for its excellence in implementing urban agriculture project at various educational institutions.



The urban agriculture initiative got featured in the *United Nation's Global Registry* of best practices towards achieving Sustainable Development Goals.



FARM SECTOR INITIATIVES

The agriculture sector employs more than 50% of the workforce in India. However, the sector is ailing due to diverse reasons and many farmers across the country are finding alternative ways for livelihood. ESAF is working towards the revival of the farm sector with the introduction of sustainable farming technologies, environment-friendly farming methods, promotion of farmer collectives, providing financial access, and creating value chain, etc. Recognising the challenges of small and medium farmers, ESAF is involved in capacity building of farmers across India.

Promotion and Capacity Building of Farmer Producer Organisations (FPO)

The project is initiated to address the pressing issue of farmers quitting the sector, as farming is no longer an economically viable option for them. Implemented in the rural areas of Kerala, Tamil Nadu, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh, and Jharkhand, the project helps mobilise farmers to form their own collectives and address various challenges. ESAF works closely with the community and helps farmers form a local Farmer Interest Group (FIG)- a constituent of Farmer Producer Company (FPC). The FIGs are given training on procurement, technological interventions to scale up productivity, improve soil fertility, effective utilisation of natural resources, and diversification of crops. The training helps FPCs to scale up their business ventures.

In 2014, ESAF was recognised as an Empanelled Institution for promoting FPCs in six states of India. In the same year, five FPCs in two districts of Chhattisgarh were promoted under VUCI (Vegetable Urban Cluster Initiative). In 2014-15, NABARD-Tamil Nadu appointed ESAF as POPI (Producer Organisation Promoting Institute) to promote 20 FPCs in eight districts of Tamil Nadu. ESAF was also awarded promotion of 20 FPCs in Karnataka and 15 FPCs in Kerala.
